Vicksburg cave life to be featured in re-enactment

The Siege of Vicksburg ended July 4, 1863. But the campaign, the siege and cave life in Vicksburg will be re-enacted Nov. 5-6 at the Raymond battlefield.

The Vicksburg Campaign Reenactment is sponsored by Friends of Raymond and Stanford's Mississippi Battery of Civil War re-enactors.

The caves are replicas of the ones that civilians carved into Vicksburg's loess bluffs in the spring and summer of 1863 to protect themselves from Union artillery shells.

The caves, which will be inhabited much as they were in 1863, are at McPherson Ridge on the Raymond battlefield.

A firsthand account of cave life is described in the diary of Mary Loughborough, wife of a Confederate officer at Vicksburg. In 1864 she published "My Cave Life in Vicksburg."



'Weekend warrior band' still going strong after 20 years

> Some call it a phenomenon, others just a rockin' good time, but there's no doubt the Vicksburg-born band The Chill has stirred up audiences all over the Southeast.

For 20 years, its members have kept a momentum that rivals bands that are household names.

The Chill, named for the 1983 blockbuster "The Big Chill," is indeed a household name — especially in Vicksburg, where The Chill Burger is featured on the menu at The Purple Ladder, 1311

Washington St. "I'm glad to know it was liked enough that it sustained itself," said Mark Prewitt, who created the band. "There are not many local weekend warrior bands that can stay around for 20 years."

Prewitt, who is a lawyer, stayed with the band for 10 years. His final performance was in 1995 at Riverfest in downtown Vicksburg.

"I got to my peak, where we were getting 100 calls a week," Prewitt said.

But he's convinced the group has peaked again since he left.

"What's that the BeeGee's said? 'If you stay together long enough, you get rediscovered," he said.

The original band was born after a series of high school and post-high school bands that "fizzled," Prewitt

The first members of what would later become The Chill were Prewitt, who played guitar, drummer Daniel Gilbert, bassist and vocalist John Howard Dennis, saxophonist Mike Andrews, trumpet-player Beaver Myers and keyboardist Jeffrey Morgan.

"Dec. 31, 1985, was our first official gig — and the rest is history," Prewitt said. "For to get up and dance as they some strange reason — it was like dominoes — everyone was all of a sudden available. Explain that mys-

The same story is true for people who have joined the band since. When one person would leave, another would magically appear. Today, The Chill has six members, including Gilbert and Dennis, the band's backbone.

Trumbonist and keyboardist Craig Tucker joined the band 13 years ago, and Carl Reid replaced Prewitt on guitar in 1995. Saxophonist David Battaglia and vocalist Barry Graham came on board during the last five years.

Although members have come and gone, the music has stayed the same. It reflects the era during which the band began. It's a formula that works, Dennis said.

"We've worked by being consistent and playing good dance music," he said. "I don't care what age group we've done it for years, and people like it."

Reid agreed: "We played for 700 Sub Deb children, and they were children ages 16 or 17 — at the Trade Mart in Jackson. When they unloaded the bus and those kids came in, they danced from the very beginning to the end," he said. "They know this stuff — everybody knows this stuff.'

The Chill sticks to the classics. In one night, they play anything from "My Girl" by the Temptations to "Wild Nights" by Lou Reed. But a performance isn't complete without the Van Morrison classic, "Brown Eyed Girl." "You have to play it,"

Tucker said. Graham added, "If we don't play it, people will request it.'

For the 35- to 58-year-old age bracket, the urge comes recall days gone by.

"It reminds me of high school. It brings back a lot of memories," said Daria Nosser Hood, a classmate of original band member Dennis. Hood graduated from H.V. Cooper High in 1970.

Wilson McClain, also a member of the Cooper class of '70, played in a band called Peepuls Choyz with Dennis and Prewitt. McClain, who plays the trombone, played with The Chill on Aug. 6 at his 35th class reunion.

"For me, it's a double reunion — to get to perform a little bit," he said.

The Chill takes Susie Harmon Hays back to those first performances at the Upper End at the Magnolia Hotel and Restaurant and at Walnut Hills.

"I am The Chill," she said. "I asked John Howard tonight if I can be an alum-

na member of the band." After all these years, Dennis and the other band members don't take themselves too seriously. After all, they call their fans who come in all shapes, sizes and ages — "Chill Bumps.'

"The Chill's raised a lot of yunguns," Prewitt said. What made The Chill "gel" back then is a mystery, he said, but today the band's image is all about a name people can't forget.

"What they do, they do well — it's one of those magical things," Prewitt said. "It's the name more than the individuals that carry it. You just got to keep it good."

The current members have no intention of letting the good times die. In fact, they hope The Chill survives another 20 years.

"As long as I'm breathing, I'll play," Dennis said. "But I hope someone will keep it going and continue to do something with it.'
